Researcher Spotlight

Shaolin Ma, MD, PhD

The 2019-2020 Foundation for Women's Cancer (FWC) Research Grants and Awards Program presented Shaolin Ma, MD, PhD, with a research grant funded by St. Louis Ovarian Cancer Awareness (SLOCA) for \$50,000 on his research "Cloaking VEGF in EVs as a cause of adaptive resistance to anti-VEGF therapy." Dr. Ma is a fellow in residency at Sun Yat-sen Memorial Hospital in Guangzhou, China, and received the grant while in his post-doctoral program at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center


In this Q&A, Dr. Ma will share insight into his ongoing gynecologic (GYN) cancer research, how the FWC grant and generous funders impact her work, hopes for the future, and more.

How would you describe your current research?

Ovarian cancer is one of the most lethal malignancies worldwide. Anti-VEGF therapies (e.g., Bevacizumab) have been widely used in patients with ovarian cancer. However, most patients will develop resistance during the treatment and eventually relapse. Here, we focused on illustrating the underlying mechanisms of anti-VEGF resistance. By carrying out a series of in vivo and in vitro experiments, we demonstrate that the small extracellular vesicles can deliver VEGF isoforms to endothelial cells. Consequently, the small EV-delivered VEGF promotes endothelial cell proliferation and leads to angiogenesis. Our findings have clinical implications for biomarkers and therapeutic strategies for ovarian cancer.

How does receiving a grant from the FWC impact your work?

First of all, I am very grateful to have been awarded the FWC grant and I appreciate it very much. With the financial support from the FWC grant, we were able to move our research work forward effectively. Most importantly, the grant has motivated me to contribute my enthusiasm to ovarian cancer research, including early detection, novel therapeutics, as well as overcoming drug resistance.



What kind of treatment progress or discoveries do you envision happening in GYN cancer research?

Gynecological cancers, especially ovarian cancer, remain to be the most lethal disease. Most patients were diagnosed at an advanced stage due to the lack of effective early detection strategies. As we look to the future, it will be very exciting to have a highly sensitive and specific early detection method developed. Currently, immunotherapy is one of the most powerful weapons in the treatment of cancers. However, the immunotherapy response in patients with ovarian cancer is limited. A broader understanding of the underlying mechanisms is warranted in the future, and I hope we can find reliable immunotherapeutic strategies for ovarian cancer.

What made you decide to go into the medical field and the gynoncology subspecialty?

This is a tough question. Honestly, I don't remember the specific reason to study medicine or gynoncology, but I pursued this field because I found it both inspiring and challenging. I enjoy making a difference that can benefit the population's health.

Lastly, could you share a brief personal bio to help readers get to know you?

I graduated from Sun Yat-sen University, with a Doctoral degree in Medicine in 2019. After graduation, I went to the MD Anderson Cancer Center at the University of Texas for a two-year post-doctoral program, where I got an FWC Award. After that, I went back to China to pursue my career of becoming a doctor. Now, I am a residential fellow at Sun Yat-sen Memorial Hospital, where I am training to be a gynecologic surgeon.

Since cancer research has become increasingly globalized, scientists from all over the world can share updated data and communicate with each other instantly. This will dramatically speed up the development of new therapeutic strategies that will eventually benefit patients. The international meetings, such as AACR, SGO, and ASCO, provide an effective platform for scientists to share their most recent findings and make guidelines for patient care. Combining the efforts from the whole world, I believe we can increase cancer patients' survival significantly and maybe someday combat cancer.

After work, I like doing excersises to relax my mind. Swimming is one of my favorite sports, which can alleviate stress and improve my physical and mental health. Hiking and tennis are both on my workout list which I can meet new friends. Besides that, I like watching movies, reading sci-fi novels, and history books to enrich my spiritual life.

Michele Lawrence



SLOCA Celebrates 20 Years of Serving Our Community

With the 20th anniversary of the founding of SLOCA, we thought it would be the opportune time to share the humble beginnings of our organization. We reached out to Kat Schudel, the daughter of founder Christina Carr. Kat graciously shared her personal story of her mom's battle and vision of supporting women with ovarian cancer.

In 1998, Christina R. Carr, newly diagnosed with Stage 3C Ovarian Cancer, went on the quest of a lifetime. Her main mission in life was educating as many women as she could about the silent symptoms of ovarian cancer and supporting ovarian cancer survivors. She spent the remainder of her life reaching as many women as humanly possible.

Known as Chris to family and friends, she was the most friendly, outgoing, and inspiring woman. It was impossible to leave her company without feeling better. Chris was adored and completely supported by her loving husband, Chuck Carr, her daughter Kat and son Jared and their spouses, and her bonus kids Heather and Bryan Carr. She was the best Nana in the entire world to Drew and Alexis Helfer and Brooke Reinwald. Her family was her life, her grandkids were her heart, and her mission was spreading awareness of the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer.

Because Christina was misdiagnosed and refused diagnostic measures by five different gynecologists, she wanted all women to be aware of changes in their bodies and to encourage them to be bold health care advocates for themselves. She discovered OCNA, the Ovarian Cancer National Alliance, and it became clear that they would be the ones to help her create her own organization in her community. Chris, along with six other courageous and determined women, embarked on the journey of forming St. Louis Ovarian Cancer Awareness (SLOCA).

Not only did Carr spearhead the nonprofit organization, but she also lobbied state and federal legislators for more research in the areas of ovarian cancer research, treatments, and getting clinical trials covered by medical insurance. Carr began networking to find any resources available to raise funds for SLOCA's website and educational awareness materials. Along with her daughter, sister, and lots of friends, Chris learned how to make beaded earrings and bracelets. They began attending health fairs, women's expos, and craft fairs to sell jewelry and raise awareness of ovarian cancer. Carr and her daughter Kat would spend hours sitting in her living room making bracelets and earrings while they talked, laughed, and even competed to see who could complete more pieces of jewelry. They did this to make sure there was always enough funds to purchase the next booth and keep a steady supply of educational materials.

To spread SLOCA's message, Chris would tell her story in interviews with newspapers and local news channels, as well as articles in any newspaper that would tell her story. SLOCA held many different fundraising events including a fashion show that featured survivors of all ages and sizes, galas, and ovarian cancer walks. To help raise awareness, Carr worked on the bill for September to be National Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month in Missouri and eventually the nation. Chris was a prominent speaker in Washington D.C. regarding ovarian cancer research and clinical trials. She did many clinical trials and her family believes to this day that those clinical trial treatments are what helped her live an additional eight and a half years after her diagnosis. Carr also had the BRCA 1 genetic mutation, which lit a fire under her to lobby for genetic testing to be covered by medical insurance.

As her daughter, I would accompany my mom to many of the conferences where she would be on the speaker panel as the survivor advocate. She was a celebrity to the entire ovarian cancer community," Kat

shares. "We would be walking out of a conference room and ten people would line up to meet mom. She would take the time to speak to every single person and made them each feel as if they were the most important person in the world. Her heart was unbelievable, and she was the most heroic and courageous person I've ever had the honor to witness. She is why I am who I am today."

A major accomplishment for Carr and SLOCA was when the St. Louis Cardinals deemed September 7th, 2003, as the 1st annual National Ovarian Cancer Awareness Day at the ballpark. This wonderful event continues today, with survivors given a free ticket to the ballgame. Before Chris lost her battle on November 9, 2003, she was awarded the first annual Cindy Melancon Spirit of Survivorship Award from OCNA. Carr was too ill at that time to accept the award, but her loving friends and SLOCA board members accepted it on her behalf.

The story doesn't end there. Even though Chris only got to see the beginnings of what SLOCA is today, she is looking down at SLOCA proudly! Throughout the years, SLOCA has been cultivated and cared for by the most incredible people that have the same heart and mission Christina had. "SLOCA has become exactly what my mom dreamed it would. In fact, I believe it's probably bigger than she could have imagined!" Kat shares.

Partnering to Create MO Awareness



SLOCA works to impact ovarian cancer awareness and survivorship in the St. Louis metropolitan area. The Organization has recently joined a partnership to raise awareness across the state of Missouri, focusing specifically on rural areas that may not have access to specialists and support resources located in St. Louis.

SLOCA is pleased to be among the founding members of the Missouri Ovarian Cancer Coalition (MOCC), comprised of organizations and partners from all corners of the state. The partnership was spearheaded by Rudy Bess, a longtime friend of SLOCA and Founding Director of The Hope Light Foundation. "The MOCC partnership organizations are critical to saving women's lives in rural communities where they have little to no knowledge of ovarian cancer signs and symptoms and a lack of gynecological specialists resulting in late-stage diagnosis and lower survival rates," says Bess.

"MOCC will be launching a comprehensive ovarian cancer awareness program in the rural areas. This includes educating both women and their healthcare providers on what to look for to detect the cancer in its early stages when it is easier to treat and survive."

The group, while continually seeking to expand partner-ships, has several current representatives from GYN Cancer Alliance located in Springfield, the Sarah Cannon Cancer Center in Kansas City, the American Cancer Society, the Overrun Ovarian Cancer Foundation, Washington University, The Hope Light Foundation, Pink Ribbon Girls St. Louis, and SLOCA.

Meeting monthly via Zoom, the group is working on a pilot program with Federally Qualified Health Centers, located in the southwest portion of the state. This is to perform a needs assessment and identify resource materials and educational and outreach opportunities. Their staff and population can raise awareness of ovarian cancer signs and symptoms, leading to early detection and better treatment outcomes. Stay tuned for updates on this important work.
