Y98's Julie Tristan served as the emcee and kicked off the morning honoring survivors of ovarian cancer at the Survivor Ceremony and providing inspiration for the walkers and runners. After the main event, participants enjoyed food and entertainment including donuts by Dunkin Donuts and music from TKO DJs. Fan favorites Fredbird and Louie joined the party as well as the Bubble Bus to delight participants and their families. This is the largest local event dedicated to honoring survivors of ovarian cancer and supporting them and their loved ones, as well as those in the medical community. Celebrating Twenty Years of Teal

SLOCA's annual Living Out Loud Gala & Auction sponsored by Myriad Genetics took place on Saturday, April 9th at Meadowbrook Country Club in Ballwin. This event celebrated SLOCA's 20th anniversary. SLOCA was founded in 2002 by Christina Carr along with six other courageous women who shared her vision. Since its formation, SLOCA has made a difference in the lives of women and families impacted by this devastating disease. Over 2,000 sister boxes have been delivered to newly diagnosed women in the community, more than \$600,000 has been raised to fund research, and extensive awareness and education initiatives continue to help those fighting this disease.

The celebration hosted 280 supporters who enjoyed a delectable dinner and dessert along with live music from ovarian cancer survivor and R&B soul singer Àngela Winbush. There was an exciting live auction with packages such as the Cardinals Suite Splendor and the Ultimate Blues Experience. There were many coveted raffle items including a Louis Vuitton handbag and a wine raffle featuring more than 30 bottles. Auctioneer and emcee Rene Knott greeted attendees saying, "You are the people that are going to make the difference tonight and over the next year." Gala co-chairs Randalynn Vasel and Deb Hill Jablonski, who are both survivors, spoke about their personal journeys and the importance of SLOCA in advocating for awareness and creating connections for those affected by ovarian cancer.

The Teal Spirit Award was presented to Jon and Alene Becker, longtime supporters of SLOCA. Alene was diagnosed with cancer at a young age and now shares her story to support those fighting the disease and to educate medical students and nurses. She said, "It takes a village and I'm so inspired when I look out and see this village." This dynamic duo has also served on SLOCA's board of directors and finance committee. Survivor speaker, Jen Majzun, inspired with her personal journey battling cancer multiple times since the age of twenty-two. When she was diagnosed with ovarian cancer, she said the Sister Box she received instantly lifted her spirit. She shared that throughout this experience she has learned to trust in herself and her doctors and tries to live her best life.

Funding Research Advancements

Siteman Cancer Center Physician-Scientists continue to lead the way in advancing new knowledge in the treatment of ovarian cancer. The Alvin J. Siteman Cancer Center at Washington University School of Medicine continues to bolster its reputation as one of the country's leading hubs for ovarian cancer research. Thanks in large part to philanthropic support from individuals and groups like SLOCA, the center's ovarian cancer research and treatment team has been better positioned to pursue novel areas of research.

"We continue to be grateful for our longstanding partnership with SLOCA," says Dineo Khabele, MD, Mitchell and Elaine Yanow Professor of Obstetrics & Gynecology, Chair Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology at Washington University School of Medicine. "It is the advocacy and philanthropic investment of private individuals and organizations like SLOCA that positions our program to accelerate the pace of discovery by providing flexible recourses to advance highly promising projects."




Over the past year, SLOCA funds have helped support the following areas of research:

Developing New Treatment Options for Patients with Chemotherapy-Resistant Ovarian Cancer

Accounting for more deaths than any other cancer of the female reproductive system and affecting more than 22,000 women a year, ovarian cancer has proven difficult to treat patients who no longer respond to chemotherapy. Even immunotherapy within ovarian cancer has had disappointing results. with response rates of only around 10%. With limited treatment options, Siteman researchers currently are looking at the benefits of using combination therapy strategies with PARP inhibitors—a type of targeted cancer therapy. PARP is a type of enzyme involved in several cell functions, including the repair of DNA damage. Suppressing PARP helps keep cancer cells from repairing their damaged DNA, causing cell death. This strategy is being further investigated to improve PARP inhibitor efficacy in order to offer more options to patients who have become chemotherapy-resistant, and to provide protocols with decreased toxicity and fewer of the negative side effects associated with standard chemotherapy.

Personalized Medicine and Better Understanding Tumor Genetics

The future of clinical care is moving towards a more personalized and individualized care based on not only where a tumor is located but also what it looks like under the microscope. Within the gynecologic oncology program at Siteman, we are looking to better understand tumors' molecular profiles and genetic alterations in order to be more precise in directing care for each individual patient. Using tumor samples, Dr. Khabele's and Dr. Maggie Mullen's translational research labs are investigating how DNA damage affects genes and how genes are regulated-or disregulated-in ovarian cancer to improve treatment options while also designing new therapeutic strategies. This has the potential to revolutionize patient care and, in the future, provide an individual the opportunity to partner with their physician in selecting from a panel of treatment options that are equivalent in their effectiveness.



Studying the Tumor Microenvironment to Stop the Spread of Gynecologic Cancer

Until recently, many therapies and approaches to treating cancer have been focused on stopping the growth of tumor cells. This is an important topic, however, there are more critical factors to consider. Due to incredible medical advances, very few gynecologic patients will succumb to the primary tumor. Rather, recent research has shown that the spread of the tumor, or when a tumor moves to other organs in the body, has a profound impact on a patient's chance of survival. How that spread happens is not well understood; however, Matthew Powell, MD, professor and chief of the Division of Gynecologic Oncology at Washington University School of Medicine and his team are leading novel research focused on how tumor cells talk with one another to pinpoint indicators on how they signal to each other to spread. Through this work, 18 new signals have been identified. Two of them already are being used in Phase II and Phase III clinical trials. The hope is that if the signals between the tumor cells can be stopped, then ultimately we will be able to stop the spread of cancer and improve patient outcomes.



SLOCA in the Community

Each year SLOCA attends community events to help spread awareness of the early warning signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer. For many we encounter, this is their first opportunity to learn more about the disease – including the fact that the Pap test does not screen for ovarian cancer.

In 2022 we were excited to return to some of our favorite community events such as Rosé Day and the Leader Publications Senior Expos as well as explore some new events such as the Urban Expo Back to School & Community Empowerment Festival, the Kimmswick Strawberry Festival, and St. Louis PrideFest.

SLOCA Supports Survivors

Woman to Woman

A cancer diagnosis can be an overwhelming experience. Woman to Woman is a peer-to-peer support program for women diagnosed with ovarian cancer. Woman to Woman pairs newly diagnosed ovarian cancer patients with trained survivor volunteers who provide one-on-one emotional support and mentoring.

Woman to Woman mentor volunteers listen to concerns, provide advice and support, and sometimes, just hold a mentee's hand. Our mentors provide hope, along with the special insights that can only come from someone with their own personal ovarian cancer experience. SLOCA provides training to help mentor volunteers learn active listening, and communication skills. In addition, mentors receive an overview of ovarian cancer and issues associated with it and gain an understanding of their own relationship to their program.

Together in Teal Patient Need Fund:

The Together in Teal Patient Need Fund provides annual financial support so that women diagnosed with ovarian cancer can focus on the most important thing - healing. If a woman qualifies SLOCA can provide financial assistance to cover expenses such as health insurance premiums, rent or mortgage, insurance, utilities, vehicle payments, telephone payments, wigs, and more.
